As the first faculty member hired to create a certificate program on environmental crime, I developed the vision for and preliminary descriptions of three courses and organized curriculum feedback sessions with my director and chair, faculty and environmental enforcement/management professionals via the MSU Environmental Crime and Natural Resources Sustainability Conference. Engaging agency professionals in the feedback session allowed me to shape the courses to meet the educational needs of traditional students *and* conservation and environmental management and enforcement personnel (a significant target audience for this program). With the contributions of additional faculty members, the certificate program now synergizes the fields of criminology and criminal justice, conservation and natural resource management, decision-analysis and forensic science to examine environmental crimes, harms and/or risks. The program is designed to promote the deconstruction of key environmental risks using multiple scales (e.g., individual, corporate, international) and offers students a unique opportunity to use a diverse set of disciplinary theories, methods and tools to explore and explain environmental risks, including regulation, enforcement and broader strategies to achieve compliance (e.g., education, risk communication, etc).
